Our series of discussions about important poets continues to be popular with members. The next session, moderated by Antoinette Brim-Bell, will focus on the poetry of Cornelius Eady. This is a Zoom event to take place on Thursday, June 23 at 7 pm. Cornelius Eady, poet, musician, and cofounder of Cave Canem, has authored eight collections of poetry. We will explore Eady's early collection, *you don't miss your water*, 21 poems chronicling the time the poet spends with his dying father.

Our moderator, Antoinette Brim-Bell, is the author of three full-length poetry collections. Additionally, Brim-Bell has hosted a series of Black History Month television programs for the OneWorld Progressive Institute and is a former recurring guest host of Patrick Oliver's Literary Nation Talk Radio

We welcome new Vice-President Sharon Smith! Sharon Smith has enjoyed an interesting, intense, and varied career. She worked in the corporate world for thirty-three years in many capacities. She was a programmer, managed teams and multi-million dollar projects, and was a management consultant. For several years, she managed a team of facilitators trained in cutting edge group design processes. She facilitated management teams across the country in problem solving, mission and strategy development. In the early years of AIDS she was active in the Farmington AIDS task force and facilitated the strategic planning session for the National Leadership Coalition on AIDS in Washington DC in 1990. 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Poet in the Spotlight: Srinivas Mandavilli

When he's not writing articles about clinical research for pathology journals, or working as co-author of a pathology textbook, **Srinivas Mandavilli** writes poetry. Although he's written poetry sporadically since his time as a medical student, during the past ten years he's devoted more time to it. Many of his poems capture something about his childhood growing up in India, including memories of summers spent with his grandmother, but he also writes about nature, travel, and sometimes about his work as a pathologist. Recently, he's begun experimenting with various forms of poetry, such as the Haibun.

Despite a demanding job as Chief of Pathology at Hartford Hospital, where he works closely with surgeons, oncologists, residents, and fellows in pathology, Mandavilli makes time for reading and writing poetry. When he's reading, Mandavilli responds most strongly to imagery. He agrees with what Emily Dickinson once said: "If I read a book [and] it makes my whole body so cold no fire can ever warm me, I know that is poetry. If I feel physically as if the top of my head were taken off, I know that is poetry. These are the only ways I know it. Is there any other way?"

Currently, he's reading *The Heart of American Poetry* by Edward Hirsch, *The Pushcart Prize XLVII:* Best *of the Small Presses 2022 Edition*; and recent books by Ocean Vuong, John Surowiecki, and Ada Limon.

Mandavilli has had some of his poems published in journals and as well as in a chapbook. He credits workshop teachers and poet



friends who have taught him elements of the craft and have provided meaningful feedback, allowing him to further improve his poems. Through CPS, he's formed friendships with many wonderful poets. He says, "I still recall attending one of my very first CPS events, perhaps ten years ago — it was a session devoted to providing resources to poets. That one evening did so much to help point me in the right direction."

Influential Poems and Poets

Included in Dean Radar's project, *Poems That Changed Me, are* thoughtful commentaries by Ellen Bass, Arthur Sze, Sharon Olds, Victoria Chang, and our very own **Luisa Caycedo-Kimura**. Her contribution is a discussion of Sandra Cisneros's *My Wicked Ways* "Preface" and the way it served as an impetus for Caycedo-Kimura to become a poet.

The submission period for the **Connecticut Poetry Award** ended on May 31; the winners, to be chosen by judge **Terry Blackhawk**, will be posted on the CPS website and will appear in next year's *Connecticut River Review*.

Upcoming contests:

The submission period for the second **Experimental Poetry Contest** will begin on **June 15**. It will again be judged by **Richard Deming** of Yale University.

The winner of last year's contest was **makalani bandele**, of Lexington, Kentucky, an Affrilachian poet and Cave Canem fellow, for the poem "Afropessimism 101: Quiz on System of Weights used (1619-Present)."

The submission period for the **Vivian Shipley Award**, also in its second year, will open on **August 1**. The 2022 contest will be judged by **Charles Rafferty** of Albertus Magnus College. Last year's winning poem was "At This Table We Sing with Joy, with Sorrow" **by John Sibley Williams**, author of eight poetry collections as well as the recipient of numerous prizes and awards. He is a twenty-six-time pushcart nominee and founder of the Caesura Poetry Workshop series.

The **Experimental Poetry Contest** and the **Vivian Shipley Award** are open to all poets; please see the CPS website for submission guidelines.

David K. Leff

Connecticut's poetry community is sad to note the passing of **David K. Leff**, poet, essayist, editor, historian, environmentalist, and so much more. He was enamored with the writings of Emerson and Thoreau. Leff himself was a prolific writer. His work focused on the connections between people, communities, and the natural environment. He edited the collection Voices from Walden: Poem's Inspired by Thoreau's Life and Work (2021), and with co-editor Eric D. Lehman, he edited New England Nature: Centuries of Writing on the Wonder and Beauty of the Land (2020). He wrote books such as The Breach: Voices Haunting a New England Mill Town (2019), Canoeing Maine's Legendary Allagash (2016), and Hidden in Plain Sight: A Deep Traveler Explores Connecticut (2012), as well as collections of his own poems and many other books.

Leff served as the Poet-in-Residence for the New England National Scenic Trail for two years, as Town Historian for Canton, Connecticut, and at the time of his death he was Poet Laureate of Canton. He also spent many years as a volunteer fireman for the town of Canton. Leff was an agricultural and environmental policy advisor to the state legislature, and for many years was deputy commissioner of the Connecticut Department of Environmental Protection. He is survived by his wife Mary Fletcher and two adult children.

Poetry Readings Return to the Julia de Burgos Park

Two Connecticut Poet Laureates (current and past) are among the popular poets in the Curbstone Foundation's Poetry in the Park series, which returns this June after a pandemic hiatus. The readings, featuring established and emerging poets of diverse backgrounds, are held in the pretty Julia de Burgos Park at the corner of Curbstone Way and Jackson Street in Willimantic. They take place on the fourth Thursday of June, July, August, and September. All readings begin at 6:30 p.m., except September, which begins at 6:00 pm. An open mic usually follows.
