Poet in the Spotlight: Julia Paul

For many years, Julia Paul was membership chair of the Connecticut Poetry Society. She has enjoyed getting to know other Connecticut poets and attending some of the events sponsored by CPS. It provides her with a nice balance to the solitary act of writing poetry. Currently she is involved with running the Riverwood Poetry series, a longstanding reading series which operates out of Real Art Ways in Hartford (and via Zoom for the time being).




Paul has a law practice in Manchester, where she focuses on elder care. She says she turned to poetry in lieu of having a mid-life crisis. One thing she enjoys about writing poetry is the way it allows her "...to escape all the other roles that have defined me, and to nurture my own voice. My main writing experience other than poetry is with writing motions, briefs, and memorandums of law. There is no 'poetic license' in legal writing, which has to be based on fact and supported by case law and statutes. The one purpose these two kinds of writing have in common is to be convincing."

Like anyone with a true interest in poetry, Paul

reads a wide spectrum of poetry. In the poems she reads, she looks for an emotional connection or words that compel her to consider something from a new perspective. Currently she is reading *When the Light of the World was Subdued, Our Songs Came Through*, a Norton Anthology of Native Nations Poetry, edited by Joy Harjo. Another book she's reading is *Post-Colonial Love Poem*, by Natalie Diaz.

Paul's recent chapbook, *Staring Down the Tracks* (March 2020, The Poetry Box), addresses the struggles of addiction, a raging epidemic in this country, fraught with stigma and shame. Two poems in the collection were recently nominated for Pushcart prizes: "Black Dot," nominated by the publisher and "One Summer Day," nominated by *Here: a poetry journal*. Paul is also the author of a full-length poetry collection called *Shook*.

Much of her recent work reflects an attempt to process the overdose death of her oldest son, which occurred in January of this year. Poems about grief speak to a wide audience, as almost everyone experiences grief at times during the course of a lifetime. About her poems on this theme, Paul says, "Poetry taps into places that Hallmark verses don't even know exist. These poems are my way of holding hands with others."



CPS Contests: A Thank You and a Welcome

CPS would like to extend sincere thanks to Joan Hofmann, who has served as our Contest Chairperson for the past six years, 2014 – 2020. Her excellence in juggling the responsibilities of Contest Chair, some of which include selecting judges, organizing publicity, receiving and processing contest entries, notifying winners, etc. is unsurpassed. Joan brought her signature stamp of perfection to her role and made it seem easy-our CPS Contests have run seamlessly under her direction. The recent CRR Contest (Aug 1 - Sept 30, 2020) was an incredible success due to the fact that Joan was at the forefront in suggesting the ever-so-timely, and important, contest theme (the environment), which coincided with Connecticut Poet Laureate Margaret Gibson's environmentallythemed anthology.

Kathleen's first official duty is our current contest, the Nutmeg Award, which began accepting submissions on December 1st and runs through January 31. Kathleen is Professor Emerita of Hispanic Studies at Westfield State University in Westfield, Massachusetts, where she also helped to found a Women's and Gender Studies program in the 1980's. She began her poetry journey after retirement, which led her to Connecticut's rich poetry community. We will be hearing more from Kathleen in the coming months. Welcome, Kathleen!

Continue Your Poetry Education!

Save the date for our next Poets on Poetry series (POP), which will be on Sunday, January 17, 2021 at 2 pm. We will discuss and read the poet Pascal D'Angelo. The event will be moderated by **Dennis Barone**, Professor Emeritus of the University of Saint Joseph. More information will be available soon on how to register for this program.

Pascal D'Angelo (1894-1932) published an extraordinary immigrant autobiography in 1924, *Son of Italy*. He interspersed poems throughout it. Although he had some success as a poet in the mid-twenties, he died in New York City, destitute. When he came to America as a teenager with his father to work, save money, and eventually return to Italy (so they had planned), he knew not a word of English and yet his poem "The Toilers" appeared in the October 1922 issue of *The Literary Digest* on the same page as poems by Edna St. Vincent Millay and Rudyard Kipling.

Dennis Barone, Professor Emeritus, University of Saint Joseph, has authored and edited many books including *New Hungers from Old: One-Hundred Years of Italian-American Poetry* and *Garnet Poems: An Anthology of Connecticut Poetry Since 1776.*
