Poet in the Spotlight: Padmaja Battani

Padmaja Battani writes in several different genres, including short fiction, flash fiction, and poetry. Within the past year, she's published eight book reviews in various magazines. Poetry is her favorite genre. Growing up, she read poetry in Telegu, English, and Hindi. She fell in love with great poems by Keats, Robert Browning, Pushkin, and other poets, and she started writing her own poems when she was about thirteen years old.

Battani writes about growing up in India, the people she's known, and the memories she treasures. Her poetry is also inspired by her reactions to world affairs, to injustices, and gender bias. Feminism contributes to the themes of some of her poems. As well as poems based on social and political concerns, she writes about nature, about longlost friendships, and sometimes about dreams. She is currently working on the completion of a poetry collection.

She receives ideas for poems in various ways. Sometimes it's a memory that inspires her writing; other times it might be a news story. Poetry prompts can get her writing, or even just the knowledge of a deadline for submitting a poem to a workshop. That's motivating! Recently, she participated in the ekphrastic writing workshop sponsored by CPS, and wrote a poem inspired by a painting at the New Britain Museum of American Art.

The Connecticut Poetry Society has offered Padmaja Battani many opportunities that she appreciates. She loves the President's Workshops and is especially thankful to Pat Mottola and Vivian Shipley for the feedback and encouragement they have provided during these meetings. Battani appreciates the monthly POP programs and the chance to associate with "an amazing group of poets."

What's on Your Bookshelf: The Poetry Craft Books Our Members Love

CPS member **Doreen Oshinskie** is initiating an effort to generate a list of great poetry craft books. *So,* tell us what books you reach for when you need inspiration.

What is your favorite poetry craft book? What is a poetry craft book? It's a book that helps with the craft of writing. It can steer the writer to focus down on the elements such as building concrete imagery, developing sound, using simile and metaphor, understanding meter, rhyme and form, delving into particular poetic forms such as the pantoum, understanding repetition...and so on.

Most poets, writers, teachers and students can name a couple of these books. Oshinskie mentions a couple of titles she learned of at a workshop she attended a few years ago; the Ted Kooser book: *The Poetry Home Repair Manual: Practical Advice for Beginning Poets,* for example. Kooser's book doesn't try to be everything. The poet gives it to you like this: "I'm going to say a few things and perhaps you can learn from this book, which I like to think of as a conversation." That attitude is one of welcoming in the new poet who is wrestling with language.

CPS Members Continue to Publish

John Surowiecki's fifteenth book of poetry is scheduled to be published this summer by Bass Clef Books out of Cecilia, Kentucky. The chapbook is called *Chez Pétruchka* and gives voice—nasty, vulgar and nihilistic— to the puppet in Igor Stravinsky's famous ballet. The poem, divided into six soliloquies, is based on the Second Tableau of the ballet, Chez Pétrouchka or *Pétrouchka's Room*.

The origin of this book? He says, "It all began listening to Yuja Wang on YouTube. She was playing Stravinsky's piano version of his ballet, Petruschka, a wonderful but difficult piece. Stravinsky wrote the thing but couldn't play it. He asked Arthur Rubenstein to do the job. As much as I love Rubenstein, Yuja Wang blows him away. I was so taken with the performance I decided to give the puppet a voice."

Ellen Hirning Schmidt has a new collection just released by Antrim House Books in May. It's called *Armed to the Teeth*, and in this book life's perils are faced courageously. The poet is armed with the powers of family, the natural world, and a strong heart full of love. 
Covid's Effects Captured in Poetry and Prose

A new anthology, *Coming Out of Covid: A Celebration of Poetry, Prose and Community*, was launched at a party, Sunday, April 23, 2:00 p.m. at the South Windsor Public Library. The free event featured remarks by Senator **Dr. Saud Anwar**, readings, music, book sales and signings, and refreshments.

In late 2020, Charles Margolis, who was Poet Laureate of the town at that time, worked with the Poets Laureate of Manchester and Vernon (Ryan Parker and Pegi **Deitz Shea**, respectively) to organize live events in 2021 that asked community members to share their thoughts and feelings about the pandemic. The programs featured readings by the laureates and attendees, reflections written on index cards, music, and artwork. Topics included vaccines, actual infections, essential workers, and racial strife. The book gathers the pieces into a creative history, including photographs from the events and beautiful cover art by Ria Saxena and Aldo Passarelli.

"Some works are funny and encouraging and others are forged by despair," **said Lillian R. Handleman,** Steering Committee Chair. "But the common thread is the resilience of the human spirit, and the fortitude and courage our communities have mustered in the face of this unthinkable global pandemic." **Creatures on the Hunt: Vipers and Poets**

When John Stanizzi speaks of his new book, Viper Brain, to be released in the fall of 2023, he compares poets to vipers. He says, "My comparison between the Gaboon viper and the poet is rather simple really. Each the poet and the snake, really do spend most of their days functioning either like people or snakes, but only for a noticeably short time. The entire rest of the time these two creatures are on the hunt, the snake for prey, the poet for the potential poem. To succeed, their attention to what is around them must be on high alert at all times, or the prey, or the poem escapes—what an empty feeling." The book is available now for pre-ordering from Main Street Rag, the publisher.
