Poet in the Spotlight

Each quarter, we will feature a CPS member in the newsletter. Our March, 2018 poet is Doris Henderson. Christine Beck interviewed her.

Doris Henderson, a long-time member of CPS is moving to New York to be closer to family. We want to thank Doris for all her contributions to CPS.

Doris started writing poetry as a child, although she was more interested in drama at that time. She started writing seriously while volunteering at a Women's Center. She was working on the battered women's hotline, taking calls from women in crisis. Her writing began to take on a new reality. Then a new member of the Center started a writing group, where she learned how to "free write" rapidly.

Doris joined CPS a little over 30 years ago. About CPS, she says, "I have gotten much friendly, helpful advice. Members learn to listen at meetings and make helpful suggestions. And there are many opportunities to be in group readings. I got to know local librarians who like to provide opportunities for poets to perform."

Her own contributions to the society include serving as secretary and vice-president of CPS, and

acting as president of the Danbury chapter for about 20 years. During that time her own poetry has appeared in a number of journals, has won some local prizes, and she's published a book called *What Gets Lost*.

Among Doris' favorite poets are Edwin Arlington Robinson and Charles Simic. Robinson came from a small village in Maine and Doris can relate, as she is also from a small town. About Simic she says, "He had many tragic and frightening experiences, but never lost his sense of humor."

Asked about practices she recommends to new poets, Doris says, "write often, observe the world around you, do frequent free writes, and try hard to remember your dreams - write them down as soon as you wake up!"

In Memoriam



December was a difficult month for the poetry community in Connecticut. We lost at least three outstanding poets.

Hugo E. DeSarro, of East Hampton, CT for 38 years, passed away in December at the age of 98. Hugo served in the US Army Air Corps during WWII. He received his undergraduate degree from the University of Connecticut in 1950 and his Master's Degree from Trinity College. He was a member of the Connecticut Coalition of Poet Laureates and a member of the Connecticut Poetry Society and was appointed Poet Laureate of East Hampton, CT by the town council in 2015. He is the author of Stone Steps, a collection of poetry which he published at the youthful age of 96. It was a moment of great pride and personal achievement when this book was placed in circulation at the University of Connecticut library. In addition, Hugo penned Point of View, a weekly column for the Rivereast News Bulletin, for over 30 years.

Hugo was a devoted family man who shared his love of art, literature and music with the community. Hugo is survived by his wife, Marietta, and his three daughters.

Edward J. Zagorski, 74, of Wethersfield, died peacefully in December and is now rejoined with his beloved Frank.

Edward spent his early life in Illinois, where he earned a BA in education in 1966. He taught English and Speech at Argo Community High School. He left teaching to earn his MA in Oral Interpretation of Literature from the University of Illinois, Urbana. He then moved to Connecticut, accepting a position as editor at *My Weekly Reader*. He also worked on the 6th grade English publication editing for *Read Magazine*. Continuing in the editorial field, he worked for Coleco, a toy manufacturer in West Hartford as the Copy Writing Manager. Ed completed his professional career as the Director of Communications at the Credit Union League of Connecticut.

He was a devoted member of the Connecticut Poetry Society; he also was the Founder of the Annual Poetry Festival in Wethersfield. Ed was a kind and loving person who touched the hearts of all who knew him.

Dick Allen of Trumbull, who was the poet laureate of Connecticut from 2010 to 2015, died after suffering a heart attack on Christmas. He was 78.

"There was no pain, and there was a palpable feeling of peace in the room when he passed over," his daughter, Tanya Allen wrote in her Facebook post. "By chance a Buddhist-Catholic priest was in the hospital to say prayers over him with Mom and myself ... which would have amused and hopefully pleased my father, as he was known as a Buddhist/Christian poet."

Richard Stanley Allen was born in Troy, N.Y., and grew up in Round Lake, N.Y. He received a bachelor's degree at Syracuse University and a master's at Brown.

His was a finalist for the National Book Critics
Circle Award for *Overnight in the Guest House*of the Mystic, won the New Criterion Poetry
Prize for Shadowy Place and won the Connecticut Book Award for Present Vanishing. He received the Robert Frost Prize, the Pushcart
Prize, the Hart Crane Poetry Prize and fellowships from National Endowment for the Arts and the Ingram Merrill Foundation.

Allen cited Ralph Waldo Emerson, A.E. Housman, Ben Jonson and Robert Frost as his greatest influences. He co-founded the Expansive Poetry movement and was a major figure in the New Formalist movement.

Allen also was a longtime student of Zen and that philosophy influenced his work.

Rennie McQuilkin, who succeeded Allen as Connecticut's poet laureate, praised Allen as a poet, a supporter of others' work and an ambassador for poetry.

"When the terrible shooting occurred at Sandy Hook, he wrote a beautiful poem that told us in ways only he could what the people of Sandy Hook and the families of those kids were suffering," McQuilkin said. "He rose to the occasion as a poet laureate should."

Allen is survived by his wife, Lori; his daughter Tanya, his son, Rich, and his grandson, Lincoln Weir.

Mishi-maya-gat Spoken Word & Music Series



The Wit and Wisdom Poetry Club (aka the Manchester chapter of CPS) will also be doing a reading for residents for the Arbors in May.


Mindfulness Poetry at RJ Julia in Middletown
