The program provides recognition and funding support for Connecticut artists to pursue new work and advance their artistic careers.

Poet in the Spotlight: Debbie Gilbert

Debbie Gilbert leads the Farmington Valley chapter of the Connecticut Poetry Society. A chapbook she's written, [M]AR[Y], has just been released by Kelsay Books, and she is the author of several other poetry collections.

Her primary motivation for writing is the wish to learn. She says, "Poetry uncovers what's unknown and connects me to the unexpected." A graduate of Wesleyan University with a major in chemistry, she enjoys experimentation and research—and she's able to apply these skills during her writing process.

She started writing seriously about a decade ago after a traumatic event which she relates in her very moving chapbook *Ransom*. The spirit of self-discovery helped her develop the collections found in her books *Once the Earth had Two Moons* and *imagine the small bones*, both of which take a deep dive into personal transformation. *Imagine the small bones* also brings artwork into conversation with poetry; many of the paintings which inspired the poems are reproduced within the book.

Lately, Gilbert has used her writing to explore beyond her own life, writing fictional stories in verse. These are series of poems linked to a narrative. She says, "These stories are inspired by historical incidents and fictional characters from Ireland, my ancestry. One chapbook, *Deirdre*, is forthcoming mid-December. Two others are still in the works—*Finches in Kilmainham* and *Misneach* which means 'courage' in Irish, which is what it takes to recount some of these disturbing histories." For guidance,

courage, and inspiration, she turns to her current favorite poets: Eamon Grennan, Seamus Heaney, Patrick Kavanagh, and Eavan Boland. Their work is "intimate and tender despite uncertainty."

Debbie Gilbert has found the friendship, support, and education she has needed to develop her poetry through the Connecticut Poetry Society, as well as from her involvement in the Riverwood Poetry Series and several workshop groups.



Honors for Barb Jennes

CPS Board Member **Barb Jennes** was recently honored with award recognition for two poems. The first was the 55th New Millennium Award for Poetry for her poem "Father to Son," in which Jennes imagines the kind of "soft" advice her father—who wanted a son but got three daughters instead—would have given to her were she born a boy. Jennes also earned a finalist nod for this year's Lascaux Prize with her poem "Not," which also placed second in the 2019 *Connecticut River Review* Contest, judged by the late Leslie McGrath.

Notable Connecticut Poets Featured in Riverwood Series

The Riverwood Poetry Series will host Connecticut State Poet Laureate **Antoinette Brim-Bell** on Wednesday, September 13 at 7 pm. This will take place at Real Art Ways, 56 Arbor Street, in Harford. An open mic will precede the featured poet. Brim-Bell is a Cave Canem Foundation Fellow and the author of three full-length poetry collections.

On October 11 at 7 pm, Rennie McQuilkin and Clare Rossini will share some of their poems. As always, an open mic will be part of the program. Rennie McQuilkin was our state's Poet Laureate from 2015-2018. He has authored many poetry collections. McQuilkin co-founded the Sunken Garden Poetry Festival which filled the grounds of the Hill-Stead Museum with poetry lovers during many summers. He is also the publisher of Antrim House Books. Clare Rossini, the author of several poetry collections, has served as Artist-in-Residence at Trinity College in Hartford.

Rose Garden Reading in Elizabeth Park

The annual Rose Garden Reading in Elizabeth Park will take place on September 9 at 3 pm. Featured readers are Frederick-Douglass Knowles II and Aaron Caycedo-Kimura. Frederick Douglass Knowles II is the inaugural Poet Laureate of Hartford and the author of *Black Rose City*. He is a professor at Three Rivers Community College in Norwich. Aaron Caycedo-Kimura Is the author of two poetry collections. Among his honors are a MacDowell Fellowship and a

Pinsky Global Fellowship in Poetry.

2023 Wallace Stevens Prize and scholarship winner **Asia Hamilton** will also be invited to read a poem. This reading is sponsored by the Friends & Enemies of Wallace Stevens with the cooperation of the Elizabeth Park Conservancy.

Beat Poets

Patricia Martin has been named the State of Connecticut Beat Poet Laureate. Her tenure is to last from 2023-2025. She is the author of six nonfiction books and two poetry collections. She joined other past and present national and international Beat Poets Laureate during a festival and awards ceremony celebrating beat poets from around the globe on September 1st at the Canton Town Hall.

The Beat Generation was a literary movement that began after the Second World War and is known for its liberal attitudes toward life. In the words of writer Jack Kerouac, "Beat Poetry gives a voice to everyone. It is the epitome of free verse using your own form, your own rules, to express your own ideas on love, life, and the world."
