

Poet in the Spotlight: Tony Fusco

Tony Fusco's long writing career began when he was sixteen. That's when two of his poems were published in his school's annual anthology. Now he is the author of six poetry books and three chapbooks. He was a winner of the prestigious Sunken Garden Poetry Prize. In the past he has edited *Connecticut River Review* and *Caduceus*, an anthology of the Yale Medical Group Art Place, and he edited and published ten poetry anthologies with his press, Flying Horse Press. Fusco also writes short stories and feature articles. In addition, he has produced a televised poetry series for CTV: *West Shore Poets*.

Fusco has a long involvement with the Connecticut Poetry Society. Over the past several decades his contributions to the organization have been invaluable. He has served as president, vice president, membership chair, website designer and master, secretary, workshop leader, and publicity chair. He's enjoyed meeting lots of local poets through CPS, and has appreciated opportunities to hear the poems of others, to workshop his own poems, and to attend CPS-sponsored events.

His poetry often features nostalgia, comedy, and/or insightful views of society and relationships. Sometimes he produces rants. List poems are a favorite format for some of his work. He often chooses some of his humorous poems to share with audiences because that provides a nice counter-balance to the very serious or sad poems that many people write and share. When he is crafting a poem, Fusco looks for metaphors that are con-

sistent with the theme of the poem. He pays a lot of attention to sound. An opening hook to grab the reader's interest and a strong ending to make the poem memorable are important elements of his work. Finding an appropriate title can be difficult, but is important. As he's revising, he looks at his line breaks and enjambments. He has found that classes and workshops offered by Vivian Shipley have helped him strengthen the quality of his work.

When Tony Fusco is not writing, he might be found pursuing his interests in photography, cinema, reading, or art. During his childhood, Fusco often went to the movies with his father, and he has been a movie-buff ever since. He has produced many programs for public television, on poetry and other topics, and has also worked as part of a crew, doing camera work, lighting, or set design for various programs. He reads all sorts of books, as well as journals and news stories. Lately he's been reading poetry in the journal *Naugatuck River Review*, and in **Joan Hofmann's** book *Coming Back*, **Karen J. Ciosek's** *Navigating the Poet's Sky*, and **D. Walsh Gilbert's** *[M]AR[Y]*.

Tony Fusco's life continues to be characterized by curiosity and creative energy.

We mourn the passing of **Laura Altshul**, an outstanding poet who contributed so much to CPS over the years. She died in January after a long battle with cancer.

Laura was was the co-founder and founding Board Chair of Horizons at the Foote School, a summer learning program for New Haven youths of all backgrounds, focused on developing early literacy, math and STEAM skills. For decades she served as a teacher and administrator at the school. She also served on the board of Music Haven, a tuition-free music program for area youths with a passion for playing and performing classical music. She was a board member of the New Haven Road Race, in which she participated for many years.

The Shearing, the most recent of her three published poetry collections, was published in 2021.

She is survived by her husband Victor Altshul, as well as three sons, four step-children, and eleven grandchildren.

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We are also sad to report the passing of another fine poet, **Elizabeth Kincaid-Ehlers**, who died in January at the age of 90.

Her interest in poetry was evident throughout her life. As an undergraduate at the University of Michigan, she received the Hopwood Award in poetry.

Elizabeth Kincaid-Ehlers taught at several different colleges and universities, and acted as a visiting writer for a number of public schools in Connecticut. She also worked as a psychotherapist and had an office at the Hartford Family Institute.

She read at the inaugural Sunken Garden
Poetry Festival at the Hill-Stead Museum and
shared her poetry at countless other venues.
She was the author of three books of poetry.
Elizabeth is survived by four sons as well as
numerous grandchildren and greatgrandchildren.

The Arts Café Mystic Celebrates 30 Years



New Books by Our Members


