
Know that we, your Board, are planning a wonderful in-person Fall event for you, our dear members.

Poet in the Spotlight: Ed Lent

Poet and Artist **Ed Lent** describes poetry this way: "Poetry is a letter we write to ourselves, then we put it in an envelope with no name, no address, no stamp and mail it out to the world in the middle of the night. That may seem fruitless but it's probably the most wonderful thing we can do. Cave people painted images on the ceiling of their caves. That's how we know they were there. Poetry assures us we are here, we saw something, we did something, and we want to tell somebody about it."

For Lent, poetry, like his artwork, is an emotional response. He says that words have a color pallet for him. He loves writing haiku, and is a member of the Haiku Society of America. Recently he has been very interested in ekphrastic poetry. The Ekphrastic Poetry Trust is a project of his which results in exhibits of artworks paired with poems, and allows poets and artists to interact with each other, "a wonderful cross-pollination of creatives." Lent used to freelance for lifestyle magazines focusing on interior design, décor, entertaining, and "how-to" advice. Poetry, however, feels like writing that is much more authentic, as it comes from an individual's uniqueness, and wells up from that place between heart and mind.

He began writing poetry after he had an accident and was rescued by mysterious beings (angels?), right on Fifth Avenue in New York. The mobility scooter he was using hit a curb, he fell into a deep, icy puddle, and was unable to get up. "I was in panic when this very tall, thin, white-haired man with *cobalt blue eyes* appeared. He *clairvoyantly* spoke to me and assured me that all would be fine. Next thing I know, I'm on the corner on my scooter. I discovered a smaller angel was behind me and as I turned to thank them, they vanished." And although his clothes should have been icy and wet, he soon discovered they were dry. Later, in bed, voices came to him, as if telling a story. This began to happen frequently, and he began to write down what he heard.

Eventually, these words became poems that resulted in his first book of poetry. Lent says that although he continues to write poems, the earlier muse is much more distant, and the newer poems are often based on memories or observations. He enjoys observing people and their interactions, wherever he and they may be, in a doctor's office, restaurant, etc. Those observation skills enhance his poetry and his art.





Recently the Connecticut poetry community lost two of its longstanding, long-honored poets: **Rennie McQuilkin** and **Nicholas Giosa.**

Former Connecticut Poet Laureate Robert Rennie McQuilkin died on July 3rd of complications from hip surgery. He had been battling stage four male breast cancer for several years.

He was the son of William Winters McQuilkin, Chairman & Executive officer of Bausch & Lomb, who oversaw the introduction and production of the soft contact lens, and of Eleanor Godwin Atterbury, who was a poet herself. Rennie earned a degree in English Literature from Columbia University and taught at several private schools, including Loomis-Chaffee and Miss Porter's.

After retiring from teaching, he became founding artistic director of the Sunken Garden Poetry Festival, held at the Hill-Stead Museum, and renowned throughout New England and beyond. The Festival continued for two decades, and was considered by many to be a landmark event in American poetry.

Later he founded an independent poetry press, Antrim House, which especially championed the work of Connecticut poets. Rennie's own poetry was published in some of the top literary journals, and he was the author of 20 collections. His poetry was characterized by Richard Wilbur as "spare yet warm-hearted and admirably accurate" with "a honed sense of the New England region."

Predeceased by his beloved wife Sarah, he is survived by three children, seven grandchildren, and one great-grandchild.

Nicholas Giosa passed away on June 29th at the age of 99. He grew up as the son of Italian immigrants; his father supported the family as a barber and expected his son Nick to follow in his footsteps. Nick was an outstanding student and won a scholarship to Columbia University. His time as a student was interrupted by the Battle of the Bulge, which ended student deferments, and he served in the U.S. Navy for two years. On his return home he decided to pursue a career in medicine.

Eventually he set up a practice in Hartford, first as a general practitioner and later as an anesthesiologist at Hartford Hospital. Nick Giosa had many interests, including painting, photography, tennis, and of course—poetry. Nick's poems were influenced by his love of philosophy and the classics, and by his interactions with people during his work as a physician. He self-published two collections of poems. Nick participated enthusiastically in the Hartford-area chapter of CPS. Upon his death, Nick's family generously requested that donations go to CPS in his memory.

He is survived by three sons, eight grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.

New Books by CPS Members

You will want to check out several of these new poetry books. Our members are talented writers. And good writers also read widely!

CPS President Pat Mottola's latest poetry book is A Town Like That. Margaret Gibson describes the book this way: "I want to be a stranger in a town like that,' the line that opens this accomplished collection of poems by Pat Mottola, establishes the crucial distance that underlies these poems, relying as so many do on the eye of a small town spectator who, keeping her distance, gives us those who are overlooked, misfit, homeless, long gone, or just plain ordinary: everyone has a story." And Pegi Deitz Shea remarks, "In a time when 'I see you' has become a cliché, let it be known that Pat Mottola sees into, under, around, and beyond people." This book is available through the publisher, Grayson Books, or at your favorite bookstore, including online retailers.

More New Books by CPS Authors

Lee A. Jacobus recently published *In a Boneyard in Galway.* According to Jacobus, the poems were written in Ireland, in Boeing jets over the Atlantic, and at home.

B. Fulton Jennes has a new chap-

book: *FLOWN. It's* an elegy-in-verse for her late sister. Poet **Joan Kwon Glass** calls the book "a stunning testament to how a traditional elegy can be rendered tender and unsentimental," and **Dr. Terry Blackhawk** adds, "Jennes delivers her unwavering, clear-eyed poems with a heartache made all the more unbearable by their simplicity." Published by Porkbelly Press, each chapbook is hand-bound.

David Mello has recently self-published his second book of poetry. It's called *Beyond the Wooded Edge*, and can be found on the Amazon site.

Some of our members are far-flung, including **Abu Bakr Sadiq**, who hails from Niger. His recent book *Leaked Footages* won the Sillerman First Book Prize for African Poets. The speaker in this collection addresses readers from the future, while haunted by the past. Lyrical and chronicle both, these poems explore Nigeria and act as poems of witness. The book will be released on November 1st.

D. Walsh Gilbert is a dual citizen of Ireland and the United States. Some of her poetry collections are narrative in nature and draw on Irish history to focus on one or more individuals living through difficult times. Her latest collection is *Misneach: A Story of Kidnap, Enslavement, and Colonialism.* The poems focus on a fictional character, Aoife McGuire, a young Irish midwife forced to work on a plantation in Montserrat and later in Colonial New England. The title, Mineach, is an Irish term meaning deep courage the human spirit musters at times of uncertainty.



Draw Me Without Boundaries is the newest poetry book by Margaret Gibson. The powerful love between a grandmother and her granddaughter animate the voices in this book, set against a backdrop of global climate change and the Covid pandemic. Robert Cording says of Draw Me Without Boundaries: "Expanding her mastery as a lyric and meditative writer, Gibson has given us a remarkable book, full of gratitude for what is here and goes on (in all its infinite manifestations) and regret for what is always being lost."



Celebrating Hartford's Buildings Edited by Dennis Barone and Deborah Ducoff-Barone

Dennis Barone and his wife Deborah Ducoff-**Barone** served as editors for the anthology Of Hartford in Many Lights: Celebrating Hartford's Buildings. Tom Condon contributed a preface and the book includes poems by many Connecticut poets, each one focusing on a Hartford landmark building. Short commentaries on each building, written by the editors, are also included. This book provides a new way to look at many familiar Hartford landmarks, and would serve as a fine gift for anyone who has lived in, worked in, or loved Hartford. Architect Kent **McCoy** says of this collection: "Follow along on this poetic romp through the city of Hartford, pausing at buildings as varied as the venerable Wadsworth Atheneum and the gleaming Hartford Seminary. You will see these and other landmarks as never before, while relishing the poetry that reveals their deeper character and beauty."

Connecticut's Youth Poet Laureate

Beginning in 2022, Connecticut has named a Youth Poet Laureate each year, for a term to last for a year. The first Connecticut Youth Poet Laureate was Jaida Taveras, followed by Mercuri Lam. The current Youth Poet Laureate is Zivi Yan, a writer and performer from Greenwich, Connecticut and Beijing, China. She has had work published in a variety of journals and has received numerous honors. She is also the founder of *The Dawn Review*, an online literary journal highlighting bold new voices. She has attended the Iowa Young Writers' Studio, Adroit Journal Summer Mentorship, and Kenyon Young Writers' Studio. She'll be studying English and Creative Writing at Princeton this fall. It is a pleasure to witness the talented young people joining our community of poets.
